A BILL

To establish Joint Operations Centers along the southern border of the United States, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Advanced Border Co-

5 ordination Act of 2022".

6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 7 In this Act:
- 8 (1) CENTERS.—The term "Centers" means the
 9 Joint Operations Centers established under section
 10 3(a).

1	(2) DEPARTMENT.—The term "Department"
2	means the Department of Homeland Security.
3	(3) PARTICIPATING FEDERAL AGENCY.—The
4	term "participating Federal agency" means—
5	(A) the Department;
6	(B) the Department of Defense;
7	(C) the Department of Justice; and
8	(D) any other Federal agency as the Sec-
9	retary determines appropriate.
10	(4) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
11	the Secretary of Homeland Security.
12	(5) STATE.—The term "State" means each
13	State of the United States, the District of Columbia,
14	and any territory or possession of the United States.
15	SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF JOINT OPERATIONS CENTERS.
16	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 6 months after the
17	date of enactment of this Act, the Department shall estab-
18	lish not less than 2 Joint Operations Centers along the
19	southern border of the United States to provide unified
20	coordination centers, where law enforcement from multiple
21	Federal, State, local, and Tribal agencies can collaborate
22	in accordance with the purposes described in subsection
23	(b),

1 (b) MATTERS COVERED.—The Centers shall provide 2 centralized operations hubs for matters related to the following: 3 4 (1) Implementing coordination and communica-5 tion for field operations between participating Fed-6 eral, State, local, and Tribal agencies, as needed. 7 (2) Coordinating operations across participating 8 Federal, State, local, and Tribal agencies, as needed, 9 including ground, air, and sea or amphibious oper-10 ations. (3) Coordinating and supporting border oper-11 12 ations, including deterring and detecting criminal ac-13 tivity related to— 14 (A) transnational criminal organizations; 15 (B) illegal border crossings; 16 (C) the seizure of weapons; 17 (D) the seizure of drugs; 18 (E) the seizure of high valued property; 19 (F) terrorism; 20 (G) human trafficking; 21 (H) drug trafficking; and 22 (I) such additional matters as the Sec-23 retary considers appropriate. 24 (c) INFORMATION SHARING.—To ensure effective 25 transmission of information between participating Fed-

eral, State, local, and Tribal agencies, for purposes of sub section (b), coordination and communication shall in clude—

4 (1) Federal agencies sharing pertinent informa5 tion with participating State, local, and Tribal agen6 cies through the Centers; and

7 (2) Federal agencies notifying participating
8 State, local, and Tribal agencies of operations occur9 ring within the jurisdictions of those agencies.

10 (d) WORKFORCE CAPABILITIES.—The Centers 11 shall—

12 (1) track and coordinate deployment of partici-13 pating personnel; and

14 (2) coordinate training, as needed.

15 SEC. 4. REPORT.

16 Not later than 1 year after enactment of this Act,
17 and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall consult with
18 participating Federal agencies, and shall seek feedback
19 from participating State, local, and Tribal agencies, to re20 port to Congress—

(1) a description of the efforts undertaken toestablish the Centers;

23 (2) an identification of the resources used for24 the operations of the Centers;

(3) a description of the key operations coordi-
nated and supported by each Center;
(4) a description of any significant interoper-
ability and communication gaps identified between
participating Federal, State, local, and Tribal agen-
cies within each Center;
(5) recommendations for improved coordination
and communication between participating Federal
agencies in developing and operating current and fu-
ture Centers; and
