A BILL

To bolster United States engagement with the Pacific Islands region, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Pacific Partnership5 Act".

6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

7 It is the sense of Congress that—

8 (1) the United States has longstanding and en9 during cultural, historic, economic, strategic, and
10 people-to-people connections with the Pacific Islands

1	region, based on shared values, cultural histories,
2	common interests, and a commitment to fostering
3	mutual understanding and cooperation;
4	(2) successive Presidential administrations have
5	recognized the critical importance of the Pacific Is-
6	lands region to the world in high-level strategic doc-
7	uments, including—
8	(A) the 2015 National Security Strategy,
9	which first declared the rebalance to Asia and
10	the Pacific, affirmed the United States as a Pa-
11	cific nation, and paved the way for subsequent
12	United States engagement with the Pacific Is-
13	lands region;
14	(B) the 2017 National Security Strategy,
15	which included a commitment to "shore up
16	fragile partner states in the Pacific Islands re-
17	gion to reduce their vulnerability to economic
18	fluctuations and natural disasters";
19	(C) the 2019 Indo-Pacific Strategy Report,
20	which identified the Pacific Islands region as
21	"critical to the U.S. strategy because of our
22	shared values, interests, and commitments";
23	(D) the 2022 Indo-Pacific Strategy, which
24	recognized the need to engage further with the

1	Pacific Islands region on shared security goals;
2	and
3	(E) the 2022 Pacific Partnership Strategy,
4	which outlined goals and methods for deepening
5	United States partnerships with Pacific Island
6	nations;
7	(3) the United States Government should fur-
8	ther develop, expand, and support a comprehensive
9	and multifaceted United States policy for the Pacific
10	Islands region that—
11	(A) promotes peace, security, and pros-
12	perity for all nations in a manner that respects
13	the sovereignty and political independence of all
14	nations;
15	(B) preserves the Pacific Ocean as a cor-
16	ridor for international maritime economic op-
17	portunities and growth and promotes sustain-
18	able development;
19	(C) supports regional efforts to address
20	shared challenges, including by strengthening
21	resilience to natural disasters and stewardship
22	of natural resources; and
23	(D) strengthens democratic governance
24	and the rule of law and promotes human rights

1	and the preservation of the region's cultural
2	heritages;
3	(4) the United States should support the vision,
4	values, and objectives of existing regional multilat-
5	eral institutions, such as the Pacific Islands Forum
6	and the Pacific Community, and frameworks includ-
7	ing—
8	(A) the 2000 Biketawa Declaration;
9	(B) the 2014 Framework for Pacific Re-
10	gionalism;
11	(C) the 2018 Boe Declaration on Regional
12	Security;
13	(D) the Boe Declaration Action Plan; and
14	(E) the 2050 Strategy for the Blue Pacific
15	Continent; and
16	(5) the United States should work closely with
17	allies and partners of the United States that have
18	existing relationships and interests in the Pacific Is-
19	lands region, such as Australia, Japan, South
20	Korea, New Zealand, and Taiwan, and regional in-
21	stitutions such as the Pacific Islands Forum.
22	SEC. 3. STRATEGY FOR PACIFIC PARTNERSHIP.
23	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than January 1, 2026,
24	and every 4 years thereafter, the President, in coordina-
25	tion with the Secretary of State, shall develop and submit

to the appropriate congressional committees a strategy en titled the "Strategy for Pacific Partnership" (in this sec tion referred to as the "Strategy").

4 (b) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—The Strategy shall5 include each of the following:

6 (1) A description of overarching goals for
7 United States engagement in the Pacific Islands re8 gion, including with respect to the diplomatic posts,
9 defense posture, and economic engagement of the
10 United States.

(2) An assessment of threats to and pressures
on the Pacific Islands region, including such threats
and pressures caused by factors such as—

14 (A) natural disasters;

15 (B) illegal, unreported, and unregulated16 fishing;

17 (C) the presence and activity of non-18 United States militaries;

19 (D) developmental challenges;

20 (E) economic coercion and corruption; and
21 (F) other factors causing a direct risk to
22 the national interests of the United States in
23 the Pacific Islands region, as determined by the
24 President.

1	(3) A plan to address the threats assessed pur-
2	suant to paragraph (2).
3	(4) An analysis of the needs and goals ex-
4	pressed by governments of nations in the Pacific Is-
5	lands region, including at or through multilateral in-
6	stitutions, evaluated in light of the national interests
7	of the United States.
8	(5) A plan for the resources necessary for the
9	United States to meet its goals in the Pacific Islands
10	region.
11	(6) An identification of mechanisms, including
12	existing forums, for coordinating and cooperating on
13	shared goals among the following, as appropriate:
14	(A) The governments of nations in the Pa-
15	cific Islands region.
16	(B) Regional partners in the Pacific Is-
17	lands region, including multilateral forums and
18	organizations such as the Pacific Islands
19	Forum.
20	(C) Civil society in the Pacific Islands re-
21	gion.
22	(D) Subnational governments of the
23	United States in the Pacific.

1 (c) CONSULTATION.—In developing the Strategy, the 2 President shall consult, as the President considers appro-3 priate, with— 4 (1) such governmental agencies of the United 5 States as the President considers relevant; 6 (2) regional organizations such as the Pacific 7 Islands Forum, the Pacific Islands Development 8 Program, the Pacific Community, the Forum Fish-9 eries Agency, and the Secretariat of the Pacific Re-10 gional Environment Programme; 11 (3) the governments of nations in the Pacific 12 Islands region; 13 (4) stakeholders from civil society; 14 (5) allies and partners of the United States; 15 and 16 (6) States and territories of the United States 17 in the Pacific. 18 (d) REPORT ON IMPLEMENTATION.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days
after the date on which the Strategy is submitted,
the President shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees a report on the implementation of the Strategy.

1	(2) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—The report
2	required by paragraph (1) shall include the fol-
3	lowing:
4	(A) A proposed timeline for the implemen-
5	tation of the Strategy.
6	(B) The number of full-time equivalent po-
7	sitions and contractors needed to achieve the
8	goals included in the Strategy.
9	(C) A description of any institutional or
10	structural reorganizations the President rec-
11	ommends to help carry out the Strategy.
12	(D) An identification of any additional
13	funding needed to carry out the Strategy.
14	(3) Consolidation.—The report required by
15	paragraph (1) may be consolidated with any other
16	report required to be submitted by the President on
17	the date described in such paragraph or a similar
18	date.
19	SEC. 4. EXTENSION OF DIPLOMATIC PRIVILEGES, EXEMP-
20	TIONS, AND IMMUNITIES TO THE PACIFIC IS-
21	LANDS FORUM.
22	The provisions of the International Organizations Im-
23	munities Act (22 U.S.C. 288 et seq.) may be extended to
24	the Pacific Islands Forum in the same manner, to the
25	same extent, and subject to the same conditions as such

provisions may be extended to a public international orga nization in which the United States participates pursuant
 to any treaty or under the authority of any Act of Con gress authorizing such participation or making an appro priation for such participation.

6 SEC. 5. CONSULTATION AND COORDINATION WITH ALLIES 7 AND PARTNERS IN THE PACIFIC ISLANDS RE8 GION.

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—The President, in consultation 10 with the Secretary of State and such other heads of Fed-11 eral departments and agencies as the President considers 12 relevant, shall consult and coordinate with allies and part-13 ners of the United States in the Pacific Islands region, 14 including Australia, Japan, New Zealand, Taiwan, and re-15 gional institutions such as the Pacific Islands Forum, the Pacific Islands Development Program, the Pacific Com-16 17 munity, and the Secretariat of the Pacific Regional Environment Programme, with respect to programs to provide 18 assistance to the Pacific Islands region, including for pur-19 poses of— 20

21 (1) deconflicting programming;

(2) ensuring that any programming does not
adversely affect the absorptive capacity of the Pacific Islands region;

(3) ensuring complementary programs benefit
 the Pacific Islands region to the maximum extent
 practicable; and

4 (4) ensuring that programming aligns with re5 gional development goals, as outlined by documents
6 such as the 2050 Strategy for the Blue Pacific Con7 tinent, in order to support sustainable development
8 and promote a shared vision for the future of the
9 Pacific Islands region.

10 (b) FORMAL CONSULTATIVE PROCESS.—The Presi-11 dent shall establish a formal consultative process with the 12 allies and partners described in subsection (a) for coordi-13 nation with respect to the programs described in such sub-14 section.

15 SEC. 6. REPORTS ON TRANSNATIONAL CRIME AFFECTING 16 THE PACIFIC ISLANDS REGION.

(a) UPDATES OF CERTAIN REPORTS.—The Secretary
of State, in coordination with such other heads of Federal
departments and agencies as the Secretary considers appropriate, shall annually update the reports listed in subsection (b) to include a discussion of transnational crime
affecting the Pacific Islands region.

23 (b) REPORTS LISTED.—The reports listed in this24 subsection are the following:

1	(1) The international narcotics control strategy
2	report required by section 489(a) of the Foreign As-
3	sistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2291h(a)).
4	(2) The report on international compliance with
5	fisheries requirements required by section 607 of the
6	High Seas Driftnet Fishing Moratorium Protection
7	Act (16 U.S.C. 1826h).
8	(3) The report on trafficking in persons re-
9	quired by section $110(b)(1)$ of the Trafficking Vic-
10	tims Protection Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C. $7107(b)(1)$).
11	SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.
12	In this Act:
13	(1) Appropriate congressional commit-
14	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-
15	mittees" means—
16	(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations of
17	the Senate; and
18	(B) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
19	the House of Representatives.
20	(2) Pacific Islands region.—The term "Pa-
21	cific Islands region" means the nations, territories,
22	and other jurisdictions in the Pacific Ocean within
23	Melanesia, Micronesia, and Polynesia.
